"Rescued" by Love

What a beautiful winter we have had! During the Christmas holiday we enjoyed a winter wonderland with snow draped trees and grasses, snow glittering in the sun, and a white, clean freshness that covered all the land. Now we are entering longer days, the joy of receiving more sun light, and warmer days are coming our way. Like so many of us, thoughts of green grass, leaves on the trees, flowers blooming, and planning our gardens are now on our minds. The joy of rebirth!

We are entering into the season of Easter, the time of the Christian year when we remember the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. As a child growing up, a heavy emphasis was always placed on the death of Jesus. I was taught that He died in my place for my sin, so that I could be saved and go to heaven when I die. I also learned that Jesus came back to life on Easter. But I then learned something incredible happened when Jesus came out of that tomb, I was rescued. "O sing to the Lord a new song; for he has done marvelous things." Psalm 98:1

In the verses of the hymn "Earth and All Stars", a host of natural and cultural phenomena, including the elements of snow, wind, and hail, loud blowing snowstorm are invited to sing to the Lord. Personally, these elements of weather give me anxiety and I'm thankful when the storm is over, the sun is shining, and after the snowstorm, I will soon get plowed out! So as I write, I am nervously watching every weather report about what to expect from this upcoming snowstorm, but I know I must place my trust in our loving God that all will be well and when it's over I will make a joyful noise and sing praises to our creator and celebrate the marvelous things that God does.

We also thank and praise God for the active, faithful, and joyful stewardship of Women in the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin. It is through you that the SWO and the Churchwide Women's Organization can fulfill their mission and ministries. The SWO fiscal year ended January 31st. I am delighted to report that the offerings from your units totaled \$16,347 and \$8400 was shared with Churchwide Women of the ELCA. One-half of the offerings from conference events totaled \$2,751.75 and was sent in full to Churchwide WELCA. A few units sent a total of \$450 for the Malawi Literacy Project which was forwarded to our synod office and will be sent to Malawi when requested.

Our Synodical Women's Organization has received \$1000 from churchwide Katie's Fund, and we have chosen to use part of those funds for providing good water in Malawi. Units are also welcome to participate in this project and raise or designate funds for this project.

REMINDERS:

I will gladly email or mail the 2023 offering guide.
 This will help you if you're unsure of where to send offerings and which form to use. Please submit Form A with all your offerings to me and Form B for gifts going to churchwide.

- Now is the time to send the yearly \$30 for the Convention Expense Fund (if you haven't yet). Each congregational unit shall submit this yearly to the SWO treasurer to help defray the expenses of the convention, enabling a lower convention registration fee and encouraging more to attend.
- Soon we will start planning our 2024 convention. If you have ideas or suggestions for our convention, please share with a SWO board member.
- Encourage your Thrivent members to request Thrivent Action Team grants – each member can request two yearly, each for \$250. These can be used to purchase batting and other quilting supplies, items for Lutheran World Relief kits, diapers for the food pantry - consider the needs of your congregation or community and apply for the Thrivent Action Team grants.
- Units are encouraged to collect a Regular Offering every time they meet (Bible Study, fellowship over lunch, making quilts, assembling kits, planning an event). The unit treasurer shares one half of the offerings received with the Synodical Women's Organization, who then shares one half of that amount with the churchwide organization of Women of the ELCA.

As our new year has begun, special highlights are shared below from two of our churches in Superior.

Zion Lutheran in Superior has been busy supporting their church and the community. Their activities have included a December cookie sale; selling sub sandwiches for Super Bowl Sunday; sponsoring a Pasty Sale at church to help where finances are needed as well as giving back 10% of the proceeds to community

organizations. They sponsor a Food Shelf Cupboard at the church and have been blessed when people they have helped in the past come back with food donations for the Food Shelf. They want to share/give back where they received helped. Other activities have included a Dessert Theatre play and a drive thru dinner.

Our Savior's Lutheran in Superior continues with many activities. They report that their women's group has been very loosely connected for the past few years. Although meetings are not back on track, they have been working hard on community and outreach. One of their big outreach ministries is their children's clothes closet called "Threads of Hope." They take donations of gently used or new clothing and have them available for anyone in need. Their families simply come in during office hours or make an appointment with one of the workers and can select clothing for their children.

In December, they had a vendor fair with bake sale and pasty sale. They also help support the annual Superior Singers Concert and potluck. This has been an annual event for many years.

Their quilters have been busy, meeting twice a month to put quilts together for donation to those in need. Before sending the quilts on their way, they hang them all around the altar in a colorful display and have a blessing of the quilts. They also make a quilt for the graduating members of the church. It is a special gift that their seniors love. It is a constant reminder of God's love through the support of their church family. They have not gotten back to the monthly Bible Study as their pastor has a weekly study on Wednesday mornings.

Activities continue to keep all of us in Lake Superior Conference searching for the next opportunity that God will give us to Love our Neighbors. Community is so important to all our congregations. May God bless you during your Lenten Journeys into your Easter Celebrations.





Statewide COVID Concern Level: • High WI COVID deaths in last week: 9

January 26, 2023

Dear Friends:

"Let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds" says the Letter to the Hebrews "not neglecting to meet together...but encouraging one another."

Those are appropriate words to consider as the COVID pandemic grinds on. And make no mistake: it does grind on. It may not seem that way at first. Positive test rates, cases, hospitalizations and deaths are all trending down at the moment. None of those statistics is anywhere near their peak this time last year.

But infections remain stubbornly persistent. Hospitalizations for those over 70 remain high and are slowly trending up. Worst of all, COVID kills five to ten Wisconsinites each week.

Almost two-thirds of residents have received the primary series of COVID vaccines. But that rate remains little changed from a year ago. Meanwhile, only 19% have gotten a bivalent booster, the best protection against infection and serious complications. Worse, serious disparities in vaccination rates remain along racial, ethnic and geographical lines.

So no, while it may appear that COVID has faded away, it is still very much with us. That means the work of provoking, taking care, and encouraging is far from done.

Here's how you can help:

- Help your community understand that bivalent boosters are not the same as previous boosters. COVID changes in the same way that the flu does. It requires regular updates in protection against it.
- Also help your people understand that bivalent boosters are important. They protect members of the community and their loved ones. (Be specific about who those loved ones are. Despite scripture, people often don't respond to generic calls to love and good deeds.)
- Encourage masking when you're together, or at least tolerance for those who do. Wearing a mask doesn't mean you're sick. Nor does it mean that you're afraid. Everyone has their own comfort level, and reasons to take precautions.
- Encourage them to stay home if they're sick, even if it doesn't seem like COVID. That goes for pastors too! Don't rely on a single test to rule out infection and take it easy if you're not feeling well. That's good advice for any kind of illness.
- The WCC is not currently recommending that faith communities go fully online. But it's a good idea to provide alternatives for those who can't come in person, or who aren't comfortable with it.

It's also important to meet together in another sense. Keep talking about COVID and your response to it. COVID may always be with us. The work of loving and coming to agreement together is definitely permanent.
